	<p>Announcement of the Ayushman Bharat Programme, in the Union Budget 2018-19, is an explicit endeavor of the Government of India towards Universal Health Coverage and towards the required transformation in the Indian healthcare system. Described as “the world’s largest government-funded healthcare programme”, the sheer scale of ‘Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Abhiyan’ magnifies its many challenges, including coverage, enrolment, physical and human resources as well as financial sustainability. Hence, it is imperative that all stakeholders – the payers and providers from both public and private sectors - collaborate appropriately.</p> <p>The session will bring together key representatives from the government and private sectors to deliberate on the implementation framework of the Scheme and explore apt as well as innovative approaches to make it successful.</p>

	<i>Introduction by: Dr Alok Roy</i> , Co-chair, FICCI Health Services Committee and Chairman, Medica Group of Hospitals
	<p>The topic is a practical implication of ground realities and hard facts in India. In case of mental health, the gap in nature of services offered, inadequate infrastructure and dearth of specialist professionals make it very difficult for existing players to deliver care and improve mental health outcomes of the nation. Lack of research in mental health has been a huge challenge in India, resulting in insufficient data to identify the roots of the problems or to devise innovative models for delivery of mental health services. The prime doers in the field have engaged with available resources and are aiming to build a society that is constantly trying to overcome this gap by increasing capacity, educating masses, creating awareness and providing clinical care. However, the big question is “Is that enough?”.</p>

	<p>A living will is a document that sets out a patient's wishes regarding health care and how they want to be treated if they become seriously ill and unable to make or communicate their own choices. The Supreme Court of India has recently recognised 'Living Will' made by terminally-ill patients for passive euthanasia. Although this has been a landmark judgement, which may provide relief to many, questions have been raised on the implications of this document. People are concerned that the idea may be misused and result in the neglect of the elderly or abuse in some other cases.</p> <p>The panelists of this session will debate on the pros and cons of 'Living Will', what precautions need to be taken while administering the Will and how can a person exercise this right in a legally correct manner.</p>

	<p>The use of the Internet as a source of medical information has become increasingly popular as more patients ‘go online’ or ‘google’ their health concerns. With the internet easily reaching the smaller towns and villages, use of mobile phones for online search and increase in the awareness levels of the citizens, ‘<i>googlisation</i>’ of healthcare is bound to grow. According to a research in USA, 72% of Internet users looked online for health information within the past year. Almost 50% searched for information about doctors or other health professionals, while 38% searched for information about hospitals and other medical facilities.</p> <p>Although this trend is helping patients to determine their own choice of treatment, it is leading to a change in doctor-patient relationships and medical providers are facing new challenges. Further, use of Artificial Intelligence is giving drug makers critical insights into who benefits most from their treatments and changing the way hospitals manage their administrative operations. These technologies may one day fundamentally shift the way that healthcare is delivered and consumed.</p> <p>With that in mind, healthcare providers must bring their digital marketing, delivery, technology and strategy correctly. The session will have experts from the healthcare technology and representatives of the providers to deliberate on the implications of technology in healthcare.</p>
